### WHO WE ARE AND WHAT WE DO

Homeless Link is the only national umbrella organisation for frontline homelessness charities and agencies working to end homelessness in England.

The **500** organisations that make up the Homeless Link network support the **70,000** homeless people who access their services on a daily basis.

### Multiple needs

Experience several problems at the same time

- Homelessness
- Mental ill health
- Re-offending
- Problematic substance misuse

Ineffective contact with services

Live chaotic lives

### **Multiple needs**

#### Some stats from our work:

- 81% had been in prison
  - 80% were homeless
- 133 units of alcohol a week (average consumption)
  - All but one unemployed
- 48% had been a victim of crime in the last 3 months
- 44% involved with mental health services
- 36% had been in care as a child
- 35% rated health as bad or very bad

# Age of first involvement in services and (length of involvement)

Homelessness services:23 yrs old (9 years)

Substance misuse services: 19 years olds (7 years)

Mental Health services: 15 yrs old (8 years)

Criminal justice services: 23 yrs old (12 years)

<sup>\*</sup> Length of involvement is for those still using services

### Multiple needs – what's the problem?

- Loss of individual potential
- Impact on local communities
- Effect on local services
- Significant costs to the public purse

## National and local approaches - MEAM




- Four national membership orgs with 1600 members

- \* Empowered to tackle their problems, reach their full potential and contribute to their communities.





### Key Aspects of The Project

"It's not just the usual service user stuff of "can I have an apple?" It's about us planting an orchard. Real long term stuff"

**Who we are** - Core partners involved in shaping the Fulfilling Lives programme in Newcastle and Gateshead has been Changing Lives (lead), Mental health Concern, and Oasis Aquila.

**Vision** - Change the health, social care and criminal justice culture in Newcastle and Gateshead so that people with complex needs can become the 'key-holders' for service flexibility and enablers of system change. In doing so, people with complex needs will themselves move from crisis to stability, getting a home a job and achieving sustained well being













### Key Aspects of The Project

#### To achieve this vision we will tackle...

"People know I am a problem but try and ignore me"

- Individual need: 'Where do I live? Am I healthy? Am I safe'
- Systemic need: 'How do I access help? Why is system so complicated? I don't understand how to get support'
- By providing three parallel interventions:
  - 1. The **service/peer navigator** that will show people how the system works and identify blockages
  - 2. The **system broker** that will coordinate and 'unlock' system blockages
  - 3. The **evaluators** that will evidence areas for system change











### Key Aspects of The Project

### Partnership and governance are key to success

## "Sick and tired of sharing bits of information to different people"

- Core Partnership clear and cohesive, working to agreed definitions of need
- Operational Group & Strategic Group Fulfilling Lives'
  Charter building on joint working protocols, monitoring,
  partnership, allocations & case management procedures
- Service User Participation procurement, performance management
- Procurement via Newcastle and Gateshead Voluntary Sector
   Consortium broad engagement of voluntary sector
- Links with other projects and initiatives Alignment to mainstream community services and development of fit-forpurpose services; links with Homelessness Hospital programme & Employment Service with the Chambers of Commerce











# How Do We Know If It Has Been Successful?

### "People know I am a problem but try and ignore me"

- Improvement of outcomes for people with complex needs investment in people's assets, a better experience of services
- Improvement for services and front line staff more joinedup, common approach, with integrated training and learning
- Improvements in structure and commissioning of services that is sustainable - Exception reporting to respond to crisis and accelerate system change; evidence of what works and the costs and savings involved
